## It is Fall, remember to check weekly for head lice!

1. What are head lice? Head lice, or the medical condition known as pediculosis, are a pesky problem that ANYONE can have at some point in their life. They are not dangerous and do not spread disease. However, they can spread from person to person.

2. How do I know if my child has head lice? Typically, children may experience a tickling feeling on their head of may be very itchy on their scalp. The only way to be sure if a person has lice is to discover live lice in the scalp. They are not easy to see, but are typically the size of a sesame seed greyish white or brown in colour. Nits are small, oval, and blend into the color of hair. Each nit is firmly attached to a hair. They cannot be washed out or flicked off like dandruff.

3. How do I check for lice? Detection combing is the recommended method to check for head lice. For a demonstration on detection combing visit: <u>www.youtube.com/watch?v=je-cWdTrhFQ</u>

4. Can my child attend school? YES. It is important to treat the problem, but lice do not spread disease.

5. How can you prevent the spread of head lice? Teach your children that lice are spread through direct head to head contact with someone who has an infestation and to avoid this kind of activity. Teach your children not to share brushes, combs or head gear such as toques, hats, bandanas, etc. Check your child's head for live lice once a week all year long and daily during an outbreak. Head to head contact may be less if hair is braided or tied back.

6. How is Head Lice treated? Consult with your pharmacist for the recommended topical insecticide (shampoo) make sure to read the directions and warnings on the package carefully. Most approved treatments will kill the lice, but are not effective against the nits. Detection combing must continue on a daily basis for a period of 2-3 weeks. Reapplication of the shampoo should occur 7-10 days after the first treatment.

7. What cleaning needs to be done? Lice cannot live for more than 2-3 days off the scalp so excessive cleaning is not necessary. Any items that come into prolonged contact with a child's head should be sealed in a plastic bag for two weeks or placed in the freezer for 48 hours at -10 C. There is no need to vacuum or wash floors, carpets or furniture. Do not use household sprays or lice spray as they may be harmful to people.
